## **Happy New Year** From Your Electric Cooperative!

As we step into a new year together, all of us at Sumner-Cowley Electric Cooperative want to extend our warmest wishes for a safe, happy and healthy 2026. Winter is fully upon us here in the Midwest, and as temperatures drop, our electricity use naturally rises. Heating systems run longer, lights stay on a bit more, and we tend to use appliances at the same busy times of day — early mornings and early evenings. All of this puts extra pressure on the electric grid.

That's why Sumner-Cowley works closely with our wholesale power provider, Kansas Electric Power Cooperative (KEPCo), to plan for seasonal weather patterns. Together, we carefully study energy needs, strengthen infrastructure and make sure reliable power is available every day of the year. While

we manage our local system, it's important to remember that we're also connected to a much larger regional and national grid.

Across the country, winter

weather can push electricity demand close to — and sometimes even beyond — available supply. We all remember Winter Storm Uri in 2021, when bitter cold, ice and widespread equipment failures pushed the grid to its limits. Events like that remind us how quickly extreme weather can affect the amount of electricity that can be produced and delivered. In rare cases when

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Beware of "winter bill relief" energy scams. Scammers exploit high winter bills by offering fake discount or relief programs. They may ask for upfront payments or personal details to lower your rate. Legitimate utilities never demand gift cards, wire transfers or payment through apps. Always verify offers directly by calling your utility's phone number located on your energy bill — do not call any phone numbers provided in a suspicious email or text. Remember to take time to confirm before you pay; real savings programs won't pressure you for immediate action.

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demand threatens to exceed supply, the Southwest Power Pool — our regional grid operator — may require temporary, controlled outages, often called rolling blackouts, to protect the broader system.

If a situation like this ever arises again, your cooperative will communicate quickly through our partners at KWLS (107.9) and KLEY (104.1 FM and 1130 AM), as well as through our Facebook page and website. Timely communication gives members the chance to take simple conservation steps that lighten the load on the grid — actions that can help prevent deeper outages and keep our local system intact.

To reduce these risks, SCEC and KEPCo invest in reliability year-round. That includes regular system maintenance, grid modernization, vegetation management and constant line patrol. These efforts strengthen our portion of the grid so it can better withstand extreme conditions.

But maintaining reliability is a team effort — and as members, you can make a meaningful difference during high-demand periods. Simple actions at home help ease stress on the grid and can lower your energy bill at the same time:

- Lower your thermostat slightly. Even a small adjustment helps conserve energy.
- ▶ Shift appliance use away from peak hours, which typically occurs in the early mornings as people get up and around for the day and early evenings as we return home and settle in. Running dishwashers, washing machines and drvers during midday or later in the evening makes a big impact.
- ▶ Set your water heater to 120 degrees and space out showers to save both electricity and hot water.
- ▶ Unplug devices you're not using. Lighting and electronics usage accounts for a significant portion of home energy use. Disconnect unused items to reduce energy waste. Understanding how winter weather affects electricity demand helps us all play a part in keeping our cooperative powered. With a little awareness and a few easy habits, we

can keep our homes warm, our lights on and our grid strong.

Winter weather can cause your home heating system to work overtime. Check for air leaks and drafts around doors and windows, then seal them with weatherstripping or caulk. Close fireplace dampers when not in use, and consider installing insulating curtains to help keep warm air inside. You can also save energy by lowering your thermostat a few degrees. The table features power lines, farm equipment, houses, vehicles and more, making each demonstration fully customizable to fit any audience. The main lessons emphasized in every PowerTown demonstration are to treat every power line as if it is energized and dangerous, and if something doesn't look or feel right, call us at SCEC or dial 911.
